


fridge.

Speaking of band, strings and chorus: our ensembles are working really hard to prepare for the winter concert coming up on January 22nd. The ensembles are singing or performing music that expresses their growth as musicians, their ability to read notes on a page and turn them into beautiful combinations of melody and harmony as well as different tempos and

pitches, which we call 'music'. The band students are focusing on creating sound on their instruments, not only as individual instrument sections, but also as a full band who can blend their sound together to make harmonious music. All of this while just beginning to learn how to play their instruments! The string students have a similar fate, as they begin to navigate the length of their violins (or violas) the students are introduced to aspects of music they would not get in their regular music class. However, one really exciting aspect of learning an instrument is seeing the connection of all the theories learned in general music and how they apply to playing and performing. Putting the knowledge the students have been building for years to practical use and applying it themselves.

Chorus, while it may be an ensemble like band and strings, is a different beast entirely. In chorus there is no external instrument that the students have to remember to bring to school, or have to carry on the bus, or leave in their classroom. In chorus, your instrument is part of your body: your voice! It is really important to take care of this instrument by eating healthy, drinking lots of water, and not using it in a bad way like shouting or screaming. The chorus students are working on music that is in multiple parts, that means that not everyone is singing the same thing at the same time. These students have to work on training their ears to keep together and keep their own voices on pitch. The chorus students have prepared a lot of music for the concert, some of it is even funny, so do not be afraid to laugh! Music might seem like a simple class but there are so many ways that a student can learn about music that it is really up to the individual, the class, and the teacher to make the experience as educational and fun as possible. Truly, there are so many different ways to create or enjoy music that it is a subject that can apply to any and all types of learners. Music is the universal language that so many people are thankful for!

In first grade, we are continuing to show a love of reading every day. In addition to retelling fiction stories, first graders have begun identifying features of various nonfiction texts. Please continue to have conversations with your children about the books they are reading. If reading a nonfiction book, ask them what things they learned from the text or what questions they have as they read.

In writing, we have began our informational text unit. First graders will be writing books about various topics of their choice, with the goal of educating their readers on a certain topic. As they learn new things, they will be able to share this new knowledge in their writing!

In math, we have been sorting shapes and reviewing strategies for solving addition and subtraction number stories. The big goal in math will continue to be getting students to explain and justify their thinking when attacking a problem. First graders have really grown in embracing this habit project in class to share all that they have learned this month.

As we turn the corner from Fall to Winter, our Social Emotional Learning focus at Lindeneau begins to shift as well. During the next few months, we will take a look at setting goals, responsible decision making, and will explore careers. This Fall we have had a focus on Kindness, Respect, and Friendship, all essential for building relationships and successful futures. During the holiday season, take the opportunity to reinforce these themes, by modeling kind and respectful actions when spending time with close friends and family.

Families play an important role in showing children how to be respectful and how to make friends. The best way is to model the behavior you would like to see.

There are several ways to do this at home:

- Help your child realize their own strengths and talents.
- Try and have a sense of humor about yourself when making mistakes, modeling a good growth mindset for our young learners.
- Listen to your child without criticism. Allow turn taking during conversations.
- Be kind, give compliments, wave to a friend, open the door for someone.
- Be understanding of what others are going through by showing empathy.
- Embrace all moments as an opportunity to learn, teach your children to accept what cannot be changed, by working hard to change the things that can.

The holidays are almost upon us! This activity will improve your child's speech and language skills while getting everyone in the holiday spirit! You can write the questions on pieces of paper, fold them, and place them in a small bag. Then have each person pull out one of the pieces of paper. Go around the table taking turns asking and answering the questions. Here are some questions you can use:

- What is your favorite holiday food?
- What is your favorite holiday memory?
- If you could have your holiday anywhere in the world, where would you be?
- What is your favorite holiday dessert? 5.
- What are you thankful for this year?
- What is your favorite holiday tradition?






Grade 4 continued...

A reminder to please keep your child home if they have:


- A fever 100 degrees or higher. A child should not come back to school until the temperature is normal for 24 hours without medication.
